A lyrical exploration of ritual and routine, *Coffee* takes us to the heart of Cuetzalan, a village in Puebla's lush mountain forests, and inside the home of a Nahuatl family. Jorge is set to become the first indigenous lawyer to graduate from his local university. His young sister is confronting gender disparity and generational conflict as she struggles with an unplanned pregnancy. But the social issues of a modern-day indigenous family are hardly this documentary's principal concern; rather, its focus is on time itself as it unfolds through the secular and sacred rituals that sustain community life. Without interviews or a voice-over narration that editorializes the viewing experience, *Coffee* is a riveting film invested in what cinema can uniquely uncover... Close-ups around the family's hearth, the sorting of coffee beans, and ordinary conversations become surprisingly engrossing, as everyday practices are revealed through sensuous, minute details. Spoken entirely in Nahuatl, *Coffee* emerges as a vital register of the linguistic diversity of the region. A hybrid approach to both the poetic and the anthropological aligns this piece with a recent turn toward sensory ethnographies. (excerpt)- *Paulina Suárez Hesketh*

But what they thought would be a simple trip to find their childhood idol, soon becomes a voyage of self-discovery across Mexico City's invisible frontiers.

Set in the ancient indigenous Mixteca region in Oaxaca, the film centers around women who must take drastic measures to ensure their future, distancing themselves from their own children in order to avoid losing their men. Cheba and Angéles got pregnant by the same man, Silvestre. Now Cheba's husband is back. Angéles's mother doesn't want her daughter to keep the baby. The two women need to decide what to do with their newborn children. Their situations cause them to be sick with Tirisia- an illness of the soul. This well-acted, female-centered drama is beautifully filmed with surreal and painterly cinematography and haunting landscapes often being used to convey emotions.

A major theme of recent Latin American Cinema – the erosion of family caused by a parent leaving to work elsewhere in an endless chain of abandonment- assumes archetypical, quasi-mythical dimensions in (this film). - *Variety*

This compelling debut feature, from director Christian Díaz Pardo, centers on a financially desperate young man, González, portrayed with a stellar performance by Harold Torres. Now González is bilking other desperate people for money that goes to the church. Catching on to the scheme and fascinated by the charismatic pastor, González asks him to make him a pastor too, setting in motion a dangerous chain of events. Set against a current backdrop of corporate greed and a growing number of poor, this film provides a powerful critique of faith and fraud. *González* is a taut thriller remarkable for its striking visuals and performances.

Director Mariana Chenillo made history in 2010 when she became the first female director to win an Ariel Award (Mexico's equivalent of the Oscar) for best picture with her Jewish-themed dramedy *Nora's Will* (screened in Tucson Cine Mexico 2010). It was Chenillo's first feature. In Chenillo's second feature, a romantic comedy, overweight husband and wife Carmen (Daniela Rincon making an impressive film acting debut) and Alfredo (Mexican TV star and singer Andres Almeida) live in the outskirts of Mexico City. They seem happy enough with both their bodies and their lives, but Alfredo's banking job means they have to move to the noisy and stressful center of the City. At an event held by his new company, Carmen overhears a conversation between two women who make disparaging remarks about her body. Hurt by what she hears, Carmen decides to start a weight-loss program. Alfred, who insists he loves his wife just the way she is supports her plan by joining her in her weight-loss efforts. Soon Alfred is losing weight easily while Carmen can barely lose an ounce and the happy marriage is threatened.
